TIPS

- Get enough sleep for yourself. You know how much you need to be happy, comfortable, and productive. Don't feel bad about going to sleep when you're tired, even if everyone else is still wide awake.
- Scotland is a place for noticing—look out the windows when we're on the bus, look up and all around on every walk, take in the landscapes, the sky (it changes on a dime), the sea, the architecture. You'll see a lot of Scotland!
- Be open to the new things: foods, people, accents, smells, etc. When a place feels different than home it stretches us and teaches us many things. Embrace your inner haggis.

TOUR CODE

- Be on time. Early is on time. On time is late.
- When the bus stops, stay seated. Listen for instructions. Be prepared to GATHER.
- When we are exploring new places, listen carefully for the boundaries and respect them. We travel these ways together—no one goes off by themselves. Ever.
- You will be in close communication with your chaperone every day. If you're having a problem, go to them first. If they're not nearby, go to any chaperone or staff member.

Aber literally means "river mouth". Aberdeen began as two separate villages: Old Aberdeen at the mouth of the River Don and New Aberdeen (fishing and trading settlement) at the mouth of the River Dee.



Bon Accord, French for "good agreement" was used by Robert the Bruce and his men as a password during the battle for Aberdeen in 1308. The three towers represent three buildings of prominence (only Castlegate remains) built on three hills of medieval Aberdeen.

Old Aberdeen

University of Aberdeen, est. 1495

Neighborhood sites we'll explore together:

Brig of Balgownie

This 14th century bridge ("brig") across the gorge of the River Don was for 500 years the only way to move large armies quickly along the eastern coast of Aberdeenshire. It was completed in 1320 during the Scottish War of Independence and was likely funded by Robert the Bruce. Picturesque, historic cottages line our walk.

King's College Chapel

16th century collegiate chapel, crown tower, beautiful choir stalls from 16th century.

St. Machar's Cathedral

This has been a site of worship in Old Aberdeen since 580.

Seaton Park

A stunning example of public gardens.

Aberdeen City Centre

Your time travel checklist for City Centre **Castlegate**. East end of Union Street. The center of the medieval town in the 12th century and the market square. Look for the Mercat ("market") Cross and Gallowgate.

Marischal College. This is the amazing Gothic looking building, built in the 1890s but looks medieval. Second largest all-granite building in the world—now government offices.

Maritime Museum. Along **Shiprow**. Great views of the harbor. Partially located inside Provost Ross' House—the second oldest dwelling in Aberdeen (1593).

Provost Skene's House. Oldest dwelling in Aberdeen built in 1545. Near Marischal College behind Mackie's ice cream.

Aberdeen Art Gallery. This is truly a stunning art museum with a collection spanning 700 years.

Union Street. Famous mile of shopping, majestic buildings, and beautiful flowers.

Aberdeen City Centre

Union Terrace. Beautiful Victorian sunken gardens. Walk through and enjoy a quiet oasis in the middle of a bustling city. Cool statues.

Footdee. ("Fittie") This has been a settled area since the 14th century. Great example of very early 19th century planned housing.

The Kirk of St. Nicholas. Medieval church and cemetery right along Union Street, Aberdeen's "Mither Kirk"

Monday, June 23


DUNNOTTAR CASTLE • DUNDEE Wear casual bottoms, any tour shirt, hoodie. Pack up and bring all your things!

Neighborhood walk

Sitting where the River Tay meets the North Sea, Dundee has been inhabited since prehistoric times. A center for jute production during the industrial revolution, ship building during the height of whaling and Antarctic exploration, and famous for its marmalade (now under the Mackay's brand), Dundee continues to be a city with a diverse economy—a current center for video game production, among many other things!

PLAN OF DUNNOTTAR CASTLE



A Gatehouse (with portcullis) and Benholm's Lodging: 16th century five-story building cut into the rock; prison on bottom, apartments above. Look for the gun ports. Imagine cannons.

B Tunnels

C Towerhouse: from 14th century, the tallest building, with great hall and private chamber for the lord.

D Forge

E Waterton's Lodging: private apartment, built around 1574

F Stables

G Palace: lodgings, built in 16th c. Originally had elaborate oak ceiling

H Chapel built in 1276, remodeled 16th c. Windows original. Graveyard.

DUNNOTTAR CASTLE Dun Fhoithear • Fort on the shelving slope

- This location has been a fort since Pictish times.
- William Wallace captured Dunnottar from the English in 1297. He is said to have imprisoned 4000 captured English soldiers in the church and burned them alive.
- Most of the present buildings date from 14th and 15 centuries.
- The "palace" was built in the 16th century: luxurious living with beautiful views of the sea.
- The 13th century chapel was incorporated into this quadrangle.
- The impressive stone gatehouse, now known as Benholm's lodging has numerous gun ports facing the approach.

TWO FAMOUS STORIES

The Honours of Scotland (regalia of crown, sword, scepter) kept safe at Dunnottar in 1651—during battles with English—and then smuggled out by being lowered in a basket of seaweed down to the beach.

Whig's Vault: Religious and political conflicts continued to be played out at Dunnottar through the 17th and early 18th centuries. In 1685, during the rebellion against the new king James VII, 167 Covenanters were seized and held in a cellar at Dunnottar. The prisoners included 122 men and 45 women associated with the Whigs, an anti-Royalist group within the Covenanter movement, who refused to take an oath of allegiance to the new king. The Whigs were imprisoned from 24 May until late July. A group of 25 escaped,

although two of these were killed in a fall from the cliffs, and another 15 were recaptured. Five prisoners died in the vault, and 37 of the Whigs were released after taking the oath of allegiance. The remaining prisoners were transported to Perth Amboy, New Jersey, as part of a colonisation scheme.

Tuesday, June 24

EDINBURGH • ST. GILES' CATHEDRAL

St. Giles', the High Kirk of Edinburgh, has been a place of worship for 900 years, established in 1124 by King David I. This was John Knox's parish church from 1559 until his death in 1572.

Palace of Holyroodhouse to Castle Hill

We'll walk this ancient route of kings and queens together and get our first look at Old Town.

Holyroodhouse. Originally an abbey dating from 1128, it's where the Royals sleep when they're in Edinburgh!

Holyrood Park. 650 acres of diverse landscape in the middle of the city featuring the ancient volcano, Arthur's Seat rising 823 feet above sea level. The distinctive "belt" you glimpse from Holyrood are the Salisbury Crags, The park has been Royal hunting grounds, a Jacobite encampment, and a safe haven for debtors. Look for the sanctuary stones marked with the letter "S" in the road near Holyrood noting the boundary of the debtors' sanctuary area.

Scottish Parliament Open to the public (try to make time for this!). This magnificent complex, designed by Enric Miralles, opened in 2004, and is profoundly moving in its details, how it reflects the ideals of the Scottish people, the landscape, and its history. Don't miss the granite wall of engraved quotes as we walk through **Canongate**. What do you think of the windows?

The Royal Mile has three named sections that date back to medieval times. The first being **CANONGATE**, "the way of the canons" or the path the priests took to Holyrood Abbey.

Canongate Kirk. This was **Rev. Robert Walker's** kirk, the subject of **Henry Raeburn's** iconic painting, The Skating Minister. **Robert Fergusson**, the Scots poet whose work was a major influence on **Robert Burns**, is buried here.

Museum of Edinburgh. FREE. Collections telling the stories of Edinburgh are housed in a complex of intact 16th century buildings.

Are you noticing the closes? What's a close? These narrow passageways between buildings were access to shops or to the common entrance of the tenement where people lived. (Imagine the buildings of Old Town being 10 or 11 stories tall!). The entrance to most closes could be locked at night for security. Notice the names! They tell the story of the place and what type of business or person lived there.

Tolbooth (Tavern). This is where you paid your toll to enter Edinburgh. Also a prison, and near the official medieval gated entrance to Edinburgh.

After **CANONGATE** comes **HIGH STREET**, the main market street of medieval Edinburgh, in the very middle of the Royal Mile.

John Knox's house & Moubray House date from 1470, and are among the oldest structures on the Royal Mile.

The **Netherbow Wellhead** still stands nearby, giving us a picture of how water was sourced on High Street.

South Bridge / North Bridge. The main link between Old Town and New Town to the north and the University and Meadows to the south. These bridges required significant mass to meet the steepness of Old Town. Inside are structural vaults providing open space where people could reside and have a shop. (Until they started leaking...)

The Tron Kirk (Market) This church was built in the 17th c. on the site of the "tron" where goods were weighed for accuracy in the market. No longer a church, it's now a popular marketplace for local artists.

St. Giles' Cathedral. The High Kirk of Edinburgh. Catholic, Anglican, Presbyterian--it was John Knox's parish church and where Scotland came to pay their respects to Queen Elizabeth when she passed. Check out the Thistle Chapel!

LAWNMARKET

The final and highest section of Old Town before reaching the castle, this was a market area for cloth, stockings, and yarn. It features well-preserved 16th and 17th-century buildings.

Brodie's Close. Deacon Brodie by day, dangerous thief by night, he was the real-life inspiration for Robert Louis Stevenson's Dr. Jekyl and Mr. Hyde and this is where he lived!

Gladstone's Land. Across from Brodie's Close, this is a surviving 17th c. tenement house. Stand, gaze, imagine!

Lady Stair's Close. Lady Stair's 17th c. home is now the Scottish Writer's Museum (FREE). A remarkable historic residential courtyard celebrating the literary greats of Edinburgh. Look up, look down! How many names do you recognize? Follow James Ct. to see where James Boswell and David Hume were neighbors.

Castle Hill. You made it! Take in the views! Inside the castle don't miss **St. Margaret's Chapel**, the oldest structure in Edinburgh, the **Crown Jewels**, and the **Great Hall**.



Dollar Glen • Castle Campbell




Reconstruction image of Castle Campbell

Castle Gloom, as it was originally called, sitting solemnly above Dollar Glen between the Burn of Sorrow and the Burn of Care, was built around 1430, but the strategic location was likely fortified well before then. The powerful Clan Campbell acquired the castle through marriage in 1465 and for two centuries it was their Lowland stronghold. Notable overnight guests include: John Knox (look for his pulpit) and Mary Queen of Scots who came for a wedding in 1563 (seven years after Knox's visit).

Stirling Castle

Naturally strategic "Castle Hill" has been a stronghold for Picts, Anglo-Saxons, and Celts since ancient times. The first official record of **Stirling Castle** dates from around 1110. Two hundred years later, in 1304, Stirling was the last remaining castle in Scottish hands before falling to the English during the War of Independence. In 1543, the nine-month old Mary (Queen of Scots) was coronated here and spent her early childhood romping on these ramparts before departing for France as the fiancée of the Dauphin at just five years of age!

Church of the Holy Rude was founded in 1129 and being adjacent the castle, became the host for royal baptisms and coronations. The earliest part of the present church dates from the 15th century making it the second oldest building in Stirling after the castle. Walk the kirk yard if there's time!

Edinburgh

More places to explore for our final day in Edinburgh!

National Museum of Scotland (FREE). See the Lewis Chess Pieces and more! This fantastic museum tells the story of Scotland from 8000BC to present.

Candlemaker's Row leads to **Grassmarket** with access to **West Bow** and **Victoria Street**. Excellent streets for exploring. Climb the **Vennel Steps** in Grassmarket, following **Flodden Wall**, turn around for an excellent view of Castle Hill.

Greyfriars Kirkyard is a place to linger, view the medieval skyline, read the gravestones, and imagine what dwelled beyond the safety of **Flodden Wall** in medieval times.

Cockburn [COE-burn] Street. Check it out, including some of the most iconic (and steepest) closes in the city. After you've explored the closes, walk toward New Town from Cockburn unto **Waverley Bridge.** Turn around for an iconic view of Old Town.

New College off of Ramsay Ln just down from the Castle. John Knox statue in a quiet courtyard. Fantastic views to New Town.

National Gallery (FREE) Follow George IV Bridge toward New Town. Gallery is on The Mound.

Princes Street Gardens. New Town side, site of medieval sewage dump, Nor Loch, now an exquisite public space with great views of the city and Castle Hill and the famous **Ross Fountain** and **Scott Monument**, among others!

Calton Hill. Near Holyrood. Views. Monuments. More steps!
